Boundary Line Maintenance

Boundary line maintenance is an important, yet often overlook aspect of woodlot ownership. Over time, old blazes fade, barbed wire fencing that might have indicated a line disappears into the leaf litter, and corner pins are concealed by undergrowth. Without maintenance, the property lines displayed clearly on your survey map can be difficult to find when it comes time for a timber harvest. Timber trespasses from adjacent properties can go unnoticed.

Proper maintenance involves locating corner indicators and lines, blazing and painting trees along lines, and clearing brush so that the blazes are clearly visible.

Know where your property lies on the ground, not just on a map!
